Recreation Facility Update

The new Rec Facility building north of the ice rink is expected to be substantially complete by mid-November. This building will provide indoor space to house the rink maintenance equipment and will allow the dedicated ice rink volunteer crews to have access to additional equipment and a warm place to maintain the equipment during the winter months. The building has been designed to accommodate a Zamboni although there are no immediate plans to acquire one.

In addition, a covered outdoor area will have overhead heat for community events and at select peak times so residents can lace up their skates in relative comfort.

The ice crews are already preparing to make the ice rink even better than last year and we once again plan to also operate a separate leisure ice surface.

healthy dog and avoiding dog-related disputes with your neighbours. Part of being a responsible dog owner is complying with Calgary's bylaws related to dogs. There are 150 Off Leash Dog Park locations in Calgary. Griffith Woods and the Discovery Ridge community is not one of them so please keep your dog on a leash at ALL TIMES.

As a dog owner, you must ensure your dog does not:

- Bite anyone
- Injure anyone
- Chase, threaten or attack a person or animal
- Bark, howl or disturb anyone
- Cause damage to property or animals
- Scatter garbage

While on a pathway, your dog must:

- Be on a leash no longer than two metres
- Remain on the right hand side of the pathway
- Not interfere with or obstruct other users
- You may not cycle, skateboard or in-line skate with a dog on a leash while on a pathway.

Environmental Corner

PROTECTING TREES FROM BEAVERS

On September 24th the City of Calgary did wiring of trees alongside the Elbow river in the Griffith Woods to protect them from beavers. The City asked for volunteers and eight people from Discovery Ridge helped them in this job.

The City's practice is to try and strike a balance between health of the surrounding areas and the wellbeing of the beavers. When required, The City uses different measures to protect trees and property to make our river parks unappealing to beavers. Depending on the situation, they may use a combination of the following:

- Placing metal wiring around tree trunks.
- Planting varieties of trees along the shore that are less palatable.
- Placing under-dam drains to control water levels.

The City of Calgary suggests not wire public trees on your own, as it is important to make sure that the right trees are wired, the right type of wire is used, and that the trees are not harmed. They also need to know where the wire and when wire is placed on trees so we can monitor it and prevent it from growing into the trees.

WIRE TREES ON YOUR PROPERTY

If you own or manage property along a river, you may want to wire your trees to protect them. The City made how-to video to demonstrates what you will need and how to make your trees beaver-proof. https://youtu.be/8xHeB5-xkwY

Fifth annual Remembrance Day ceremony

Please join your neighbours and the King's Own Calgary Regiment on Friday, November 11, 2016 for our fifth annual Remembrance Day ceremony at Battalion Park. Battalion Park, originally named Camp Sarcee in 1915, commemorates the soldiers who trained here for the trench warfare of World War I. Members of the Calgary, Lethbridge, Central Alberta and Edmonton battalions hauled over 16,000 stones onto the hill to form the numbers 137, 113, 151 and 51, representing the regimental numbers of their battalions. In 1991, after members of the 137 Battalion lobbied to have the stones declared a historic site, Battalion Park was opened.

We worked with the Parks Foundation, Signal Hill Community Association, and City administration to declare Battalion Park a designated Municipal Historic Resource on July 27, 2015. For last year's 100th Anniversary ceremony, I supported our application for a Federal Historic Designation of this site, and we hope to honour this designation during Canada's sesquicentennial with you next year. We hope you can join your community in a moment of silence to reflect on the sacrifices made by these brave Canadians.

DRCA News - RING ROAD

SW Ring Road Update

The SW leg of Calgary's Ring Road is proceeding and the Discovery Ridge Community Association (DRCA) Ring Road Committee continues to proactively work with Alberta Transportation (AT), our MLA and the Minister of Transportation to mitigate the potential impact of the imminent Southwest (SWCRR) and West Calgary Ring Road (WCRR) on our community. This is another article that we aim to be part of a string of on-going updates to keep our residents informed about the segment of the Calgary Ring Road along our northern boundary.

Ring Road Timing & Status Update

Many of you have seen the preliminary survey work along Highway 8 over the past several months as part of a P3 (Private Public Partnership) project or a Design-Build-Finance-Operate (DBFO) process to build the SWCRR. Mountain View Partners (MVP) was selected earlier this September as the primary contractor. MVP consists of Merdiam, Kiewit, Ledcor, Connor Clark and Lunn.

Their winning bid or contract is worth

\$1.42B in 2016 dollars, paid over a 35-year term of the contract, and follows a selection process which began in July 2015. Two other consortia submitted bids at \$1.88B and \$1.55B.

Under the agreement, the province will fund 60% of the capital construction cost, which will be paid during the five-year construction phase. MVP will finance the remaining 40% over the 30-Year operating period. The Government of Canada has committed up to 25% of eligible costs, including design, construction, engineering, project management and utility relocations, as part of the 2014 New Building Canada Plan – National Infrastructure Component.

The full construction of this 21 km segment (31 km when you include connector road upgrades), which runs from the Elbow Springs golf club, down through the Tsuut'ina reserve, to Spruce Meadows Trail and across to Macleod Trail SE, is slated to begin this fall and expected to be open to traffic in 2021.

As we noted in an earlier article, the Highway 8 portion of the Ring Road is now staged in two parts with part one now included in the SWCRR project, set to begin construction this fall. The status



of the WCRR project is still on hold and currently not anticipated to begin for another 3 to 4 years. However, the timing of the WCRR is contingent on future Provincial budget decisions and although the cost of the SWCRR is now known, the status of the WCRR remains unchanged and is not within the Province's 3 year capital plan. When the decision is made to proceed with the WCRR, it is expected to take 3 to 4 years from that point to complete.

Public Information Meeting to Follow

It is the DRCA Board's understanding that the primary contractor will be required to hold a Public Information Meeting on the latest details of the design sometime in November 2016. We would advise everyone interested in the roadway to stay tuned for the announcement of the actual date in the coming weeks. Our committee is working with Alberta Transportation to ensure that the primary contractor partner is well equipped with significant

details on the road design, including cross sections, road profiles, sound attenuation measures, landscaping, lighting and proximity of the road alignment to our northern boundary, etc.

DRCA's Context Sensitive Design Approach

As the final design unfolds and construction proceeds, the DRCA Ring Road Committee continues to focus on ensuring the roadway is designed and constructed in the most socio-economic and environmentally sensitive manner. We will be maintaining an active communication protocol with AT staff to ensure we are properly informed about key stages of the project and pass this information onto our residents while continuing to be on alert to ensure key context sensitive (not a one size fits all) design considerations are properly implemented, such as:

• fiscally responsible design, especially in the current economic conditions;

- accounting for changing lifestyle, demographic and mobility trends;
- environmentally sensitive design and minimizing overall footprint/ cost of roadway;
- protecting/conserving as much existing vegetation and terrain

as possible, especially close to our residents' north property line adjacent the TUC;

- innovative softscaping and above average sound attenuation;
- strategic visual screening wherever possible;
- strict controls on light pollution;
- intelligent construction staging;

• consistent communication protocols with AT during all stages of design and construction through to post construction; and

• minimizing impact on property value.

DRCA Does NOT Support Regional Ring Road

Although the DRCA was able to convince AT to adapt the phase I roadway alignment farther away from our community's north boundary, we continue to disagree with AT's insistence to accommodate a Regional (second or outer) Ring Road in the current design, a concept that was first introduced in 2006. This would mean that the TUC (Transportation Utility Corridor) adjacent to our community and all related overpasses along the SWCRR are being planned to potentially accommodate a 14 to 16 lane highway in the future. The DRCA supports the development of the Ring Road, but we continue to lobby to change AT's mandate and limit this highway to a single Ring Road with a maximum of 8 to 10 lanes. Our neighbouring communities of Springbank Hill and Elbow Valley also share this position. There is a shared concern whether the magnitude of this proposed roadway will ever be needed, as well as how does the scale of this road fit within our current climate change agenda, sustainable mobility choices and carbon pricing era.

Move Forward Objectives

At this point in time, we continue to work primarily with our MLA Mike Ellis as our conduit to Minister of Transportation, Brian Mason, to see if we can shift AT's current objective away from accommodating a second/regional ring road, and to pursue further value enhancing and cost savings engineering changes to the overall roadway design. Your Board and its Ring Road committee are dedicated to continue the extensive dialogue with our elected officials and senior AT staff to ensure the best context sensitive, functional design is implemented.

Once the designs are finalized by the P3 partners, we will request the drawings to be posted on the DRCA website.

The DRCA Ring Road Committee and your Board will endeavour to keep our community up to date on any new information on the status of the Southwest and West Calgary Ring Road. OH SO DELICIOUS GINGERBREAD

RECIPE

Servings: Makes 1 9-inch square cake (about 16 servings) Cook Time: 35 Minutes Total Time: 50 Minutes

Ingredients

- I-1/2 cups all-purpose flour, spooned into measuring cup and leveled-off with back edge of knife
- I teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons ground ginger
- I teaspoon ground cinnamon
- I/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into 1/2-inch chunks
- 2/3 cup dark brown sugar
- 2/3 cup mild-flavored molasses, such as Grandma's Original (not Robust or Blackstrap)
- 2/3 cup boiling water
- I large egg

Instructions

I. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9-inch square pan with nonstick cooking spray. Add a few tablespoons of flour to the pan; shake and turn pan until bottom and sides are evenly coated with a light dusting flour. Holding pan upside-down over sink, tap out any excess flour.

2. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, salt, ginger, cinnamon and cloves. Set aside.

3. In a large bowl, combine, butter, dark brown sugar, molasses and boiling water. Whisk until butter is melted. When mixture is luke warm, whisk in egg.

4. Add dry ingredients to wet ingredients and whisk until just combined and there are no more lumps. Pour batter into prepared pan and bake for about 35 minutes, or until the edges look dark and the middle feels firm to the touch. Set pan on a rack to cool slightly, then cut into squares and serve. This cake is best served warm out of the oven or reheated.
